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About Us

Our mission is to invest in outstanding Australians from all fields of endeavour who demonstrate remarkable qualities of leadership and have the ability to deliver outcomes and inspire others for the benefit of Australia.

The General Sir John Monash Foundation was established in 2001 with an initial contribution from the Australian Federal Government together with further contributions from corporate supporters and private donors.

Its purpose is to raise funds for, and to administer, Australia's own postgraduate scholarships—the John Monash Scholarships—to foster leadership, expertise and international networks, as well as build Australia's capabilities for the future.

The John Monash Scholarships are amongst the most important postgraduate scholarships currently available in Australia.

The John Monash Scholars

To date, the General Sir John Monash Foundation has awarded 182 Scholarships. These John Monash Scholars come from a diverse range of disciplines, possess a distinct capacity for leadership and are making significant contributions to Australia's future as scientists, academics, artists, business leaders, entrepreneurs, lawyers and policy experts.

General Sir John Monash: A man for all times



General Sir John Monash was recognised as a great leader on the battlefields of northern France in the First World War.

However, this seminal role was only part of his enduring legacy. He was an outstanding scholar, engineer, public servant and civic leader – founding member of community bodies such as Rotary, as well as the driving force behind the ANZAC commemorations and the remarkable repatriation of around 160,000 Australian troops; newly trained with professional and trade skills acquired in France and England while waiting for their safe passage to Australia.

He is an inspiration to all Australians and the guiding spirit of the Foundation.

2018 marks the Centenary of General Sir John Monash Knighthood

The ordnance shown in the background is captured material brought back from the vicinity of Warfusee-Abancourt; it was captured on 8 August by Australian troops.

On 12th August 1918, four days after the Allied offensive against the Germans at Amiens, Lieutenant General Sir John Monash was made a Knight Commander of the Order of the Bath by King George V at Château de Bertangles in France. This was the first time in 200 years that a British monarch had knighted a military commander on the battlefield.

"A square of carpet had been arranged in the centre of the piazza and on it stood a small table, a footstool, and a drawn sword. The King then had my name called and I stepped up before him and, at his behest, knelt and received the accolade of knighthood, and, when he had bidden me rise, he presented me with the insignia of a Knight Commander of the Bath. He shook hands most warmly and made me a little speech, commending my work and that of the Australian troops."

Message from the Chairman

The Year in Review

This year has been a year of great financial support and recognition for the Foundation. We have been recognised with significant new perpetual funding commitments from the Federal Government, the State Government of Victoria and the Lee Liberman Charitable Foundation. We have also received substantial scholarships from Tim Fairfax AO and Gandel Philanthropy, specifically for support of the arts.

The nation recently lost two great leaders: firstly the passing of former Prime Minister Bob Hawke AC in May and then Tim Fischer AC in August. We were thrilled that the Federal Government chose to donate two perpetual scholarships within the Foundation in honour of these great Australian leaders and proud that we have been recognised as the avenue through which the nation commemorates the lives and achievements of great leaders. We are sure that each man would have been very proud to have talented young people pursuing careers for the benefit of the nation, in their name and carrying on their legacy. One can have no better commemoration than a perpetual investment in human capital.

Bob Hawke AC, like General Sir John Monash was a leader not afraid to take on a challenge and a great believer in higher education and the power of knowledge which should be utilised for the benefit of the nation. Similarly, Tim Fischer AC reflected the values that we hold dear within the Foundation. He was a founding member of the Foundation, served on the Board for a short period and as Chairman of the Promotions Committee, remaining a devoted advocate and supporter of the Foundation. He was an expert on John Monash himself and his extensive research on the history and achievement of the man culminated in the publication of his book Maestro John Monash: Australia's Greatest Citizen General in 2014. He also dedicated considerable energy to a campaign to elevate posthumously General Monash to the rank of Field Marshall.

This past financial year has therefore been a strong one for the Foundation. Our perpetual endowment has had solid growth, the collective Chairman's Circle fund and Universities' Consortia fund each provided multiple scholarships and our operational budget has benefitted from support through the Bennelong Foundation which has given us pro bono accommodation with increased space on the top floor in Bennelong House, our home since 2009.

This year we welcomed 17 new scholars to the Foundation from over 300 applicants. This cohort comprises 9 women and 8 men who will be addressing challenges in a wide variety of subject areas including security and conflict, alternative energy, regenerative medicine, remote healthcare, tropical medicine, urban planning, ethical supply chains, biomedical engineering and complex law reform. We are confident that they will make great contributions to their particular fields as practitioners and leaders.

The formal presentation ceremony for the 2019 Scholars in February was the last one presided over by General the Honourable Sir Peter Cosgrove AK CVO MC (Retd) as Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia and our Patron in Chief. We are very grateful for his committed engagement and support of the Foundation which goes back to his time as Chairman from 2006 to 2009. He has presented the scholarship awards to new scholars at four ceremonies at the Shrine of Remembrance and we are grateful that Lady Cosgrove accompanied him on each occasion. We look forward to an association and friendship long into the future and have honoured him and Lady Cosgrove on the cover of this Annual Report.

The Scholar Advisory Committee has been operating effectively with scholar engagement around the world enhanced by regular gatherings both among scholars and with the broader Australian community world-wide, including with Consuls General, Ambassadors and business leaders, many of whom are executives from our corporate supporters based overseas. The Foundation values these important relationships as we continue to establish our global presence, with so many outstanding scholars participating and

contributing to the academic discourse and research at many prestigious universities across the world.

We are looking forward to the next Global John Monash Scholars Symposium in Melbourne in December 2019 which will be kindly hosted by the University of Melbourne and expect a substantial number of scholars to participate, including Alumni from across Australia and overseas. This robust engagement of our scholar community is greatly facilitated by the important funding provided by our Alumni Ambassadors. It is key to enhancing cohesion across our scholar community as we grow in numbers and facilitating collaboration among Scholars. It is this 'network' effect of scholars, across disciplines and their exchange of ideas that we think is a special benefit to the nation that the Foundation can provide.



Bianca comes to us with over 15 years' experience in philanthropy, CSR, business development and social impact strategy, across the corporate and not-for-profit sectors. Although currently working part-time she has made a substantial difference to the capacity of the team and enhanced our productive dynamic.

Patronage

This year we have three new Patrons across the country and look forward to developing our relationships with them all.

The Honourable Kim Beazley AC Governor of Western Australia accepted our request for patronage in December 2018 and we look forward to introducing him to the 2020 West Australian Scholars in November 2019. In June 2019, New South Wales Governor, the Honourable Margaret Beazley AO QC formally became a Patron and will host the new 2020 New South Wales Scholars at a reception also in November.

His Excellency General the Honourable David Hurley AC DSC (Retd) became our Patron in Chief most recently, following his succession of General the Honourable Sir Peter Cosgrove AK CVO MC (Ret) as Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia. We were fortunate that His Excellency was our guest of honour at the announcement ceremony for the 2019 Scholars in December 2018 at the Opera House, so he is already very familiar with the Foundation. We look forward to introducing him to the 2020 Scholars in the new year at our traditional Presentation Ceremony.



The Foundation values greatly the patronage of our Governors and the Governor-General and the national engagement these relationships enhance. We look forward to developing these new partnerships and sharing the pleasure of introducing new and past scholars and their progress over the years ahead.

The Year Ahead

Our annual program is always comprehensive with the cycle of announcing and inducting the new cohort of Scholars; the preparation and management of the applications and the many layered selection process; the general business of fundraising and funds management and ensuring meaningful engagement across our stakeholders including Supporters and Scholars.

In the year ahead we look forward to the 2019 John Monash Scholars Global Symposium in December. The Symposium, our first to be held in Australia, will be hosted by the University of Melbourne. It will be a great illustration of the potency of the community with over 70 Scholars expected to participate from across the globe. The intention is to alternate the location of this important meeting of Scholarly minds between an overseas location and Australia. With many more Alumni now returned home, rotating destinations will enable broader involvement and allow us to include our University Consortia members as well as other supporters in the discourse and related presentations. A following public lecture will be held in March 2020, also hosted by the University of Melbourne.

We continually work to facilitate collaboration opportunities for Scholars across all sectors and creating professional development opportunities for them. With our goal to build the scholarship endowment to \$50 million by 2025 we will also be focused on strategic development. Fortunately we have a dedicated team and a deeply engaged Board with so much to be done.

Our dedication to invest in outstanding Australians, to foster leadership and expertise and be key contributors to a bright future for Australia, inspires all of us at the Foundation as does the invaluable support of our donors and volunteers who make it possible for us to fulfil our mission. We hope that reading about our work and the achievements of the John Monash Scholars in the pages that follow will inspire you also.



The John Monash Scholarship selection process is integral to the Foundation's work. It follows a framework of governance designed to ensure an enriching experience for each applicant as it evaluates excellence in their chosen fields, evidence of leadership and the potential to contribute to a better Australia.

To ensure we reach the widest pool of potential applicants, a comprehensive marketing campaign is conducted many months prior to applications officially opening. This includes presentations held in universities around the country by Foundation staff and John Monash Alumni and direct promotion by various industry bodies and government organisations. The Foundation also hosts webinars to facilitate live Q & A sessions with interested applicants.

Preparations for selection begin in January and involve recruiting selection volunteers, securing dates and locations for all panels. The success of the program is not only a result of the rigorous three stages of selection, but also a result of the time and effort put into planning before the applications go live.

On May 1st, 2018 applications for the 2019 John Monash Scholarships officially opened. Applicants were given three months to prepare and submit their application prior to the close date of August 1st, 2018. During this period, marketing and promotions continued, with the Foundation fielding many queries from incoming candidates.

Following the close of applications online reviewing commences. Candidates were shortlisted for interview by more than 70 volunteer reviewers over a two-week period. Through the hard work and dedication of our volunteers, 109 of the 304 candidates were progressed to the first round of interviews.

The subsequent six-week period was a very busy and exciting time for the Foundation. From August 30th until the September 26th, 2018, the Foundation ran panels in every State and Territory, including two in both NSW and Victoria, and one by video conference for candidates already overseas at the time of applying.

The first round of interviews concluded on September 26th and 40 candidates progressed to the national (and final) round of interviews. The national panels were held over two days in Melbourne and two days in Sydney. These four days were generously hosted by Allens international law firm, longstanding supporters of the Foundation.

In 2018, 17 outstanding John Monash Scholars were selected across a diverse range of disciplines, all with a deep commitment and vision for making a positive contribution to the future of our nation. The selection of Scholars would not be possible without the volunteered time and expertise of our online reviewers, first and national round interview Panel Chairs, Panellists and the Secretariats around the country. In total, more than 150 volunteers gave their time to the Scholarship selection process amid their already busy schedules. The selection of John Monash Scholars is unique in that each person involved is dedicated to ensuring the process is a positive experience and contributes to the personal journey of all applicants.

Dustin completed a Bachelor of Arts (Honours) from Swinburne University of Technology and an MPhil in Development Studies from the University of Cambridge. He worked on refugee issues in Australia before spending the past decade supporting social change movements in Asia and East Africa, most recently based in Somalia. Dustin is motivated by many inspiring people defying adverse situations and to this end will pursue a PhD in Development Studies at the University of Cambridge. He hopes his research and advocacy will improve the effectiveness of Australia's aid in supporting civil society in fragile countries, which is critical to advancing peace and

Zoe has a Bachelor of Laws (Honours) from the University of Western Australia (UWA). She is a solicitor at the State Solicitor's Office of Western Australia, lecturer and tutor at UWA Law School, and an elected member of WA Law Society's governing Council. In 2016, she was Associate to the Hon. Justice Barker at the Federal Court of Australia. Zoe's criminal justice reforms in relation to Indigenous peoples with FASD have been adopted by a Senate Standing Committee, published in peer reviewed journals and presented at international conferences. At 14 Zoe established Bridges Eating Disorders Association. Zoe will study a Master of Laws at Columbia University focusing on criminal justice responses to neurodevelopmental disorders, particularly in the context of Indigenous populations.



Melissa-Ann Gillies Roth/Segal John Monash Harvard Scholar Master of Public Policy, Harvard University

Melissa-Ann has a Bachelor of Laws and Bachelor of Arts (International Relations) from the University of New South Wales. She is a Management Consultant at McKinsey & Company, where her work has focused on strategy and regulatory reform in the public sector – both in Australia and the United Kingdom. Her ambition is to meaningfully reform social policy in Australia. In particular, she is interested in designing and implementing policy interventions to reduce the incidence and impact of long-term welfare dependency. Melissa-Ann will study for a Master of Public Policy at the Harvard Kennedy School, focusing on political and economic development.



Roden Cutler NSW John Monash Scholar Master of Business Administration, University of Oxford

Freya has a Bachelor of Arts (Honours) from the University of Sydney. As the Creative Technology Awardee in the University of Arts London business accelerator program, she is currently building a social enterprise that uses technology to connect garment workers to non-exploitative employment opportunities. Freya will study an MBA at the University of Oxford in order to develop and implement an alternative supply chain for the Australian Fashion Industry and transform Australia's Fashion Industry into a global best practice model for ethical fashion with women's empowerment at its core.



Dr Brendan Jones Chairman's Circle John Monash Scholar PhD in Regenerative Medicine, University College London

Brendan graduated from the University of Melbourne as Valedictorian of the MBBS/BMedSc Class of 2010. He is a Royal Australasian College of Surgeons advanced trainee in Paediatric Surgery with a focus on major congenital abnormalities. Many of these anomalies lead to life-shortening organ failure. Brendan will undertake Doctoral studies in intestinal organ engineering at University College London, Great Ormond Street Institute of Child Health. The aim of his research is to develop techniques to produce organs on demand from the patient's own stem cells, providing the child with a durable and functionally-matched replacement organ. Brendan plans to return to Australia with the skills to translate these cutting-edge therapies from the laboratory bench to the treatment of Australian children.

Captain William Leben is an Armoured Corps officer in the Australian Regular Army. He has a Bachelor of Arts (Honours) in International and Political Studies from the University of New South Wales, Canberra. He recently returned from operations as a Training Team Leader in Iraq. With his John Monash Scholarship, William will undertake an MPhil in Development Studies at the University of Oxford. William's particular interest is in processes of change and the causes of conflict in Australia's near region. On completion of his studies he intends to continue service with the Army making contributions to Defence and foreign policy.



Alexander Makarowsky Commonwealth Bank of Australia John Monash Scholar MSc (Energy, Technology and Climate Policy), University College London

Alexander has a Bachelor of Telecommunications Engineering (Honours) from the University of Adelaide, where he studied as a Charles Hawker Memorial Scholar. With his John Monash Scholarship, he will undertake an MSc (Energy, Technology and Climate Policy) and plans to return to the Australian energy sector. Volunteering in Timor-Leste instilled Alexander with a strong desire to support the sustainable development of Australia's neighbours and to lead the world in addressing shared challenges, such as climate change. Alexander aims to help create the next generation of reliable, inexpensive and low-emissions energy systems and to further the use of scientific modelling in public policy.



Dr William Mitchell Chairman's Circle John Monash Scholar Master of Public Health, Harvard University

William completed his Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery from the University of Adelaide and a Graduate Diploma of Clinical Education at the University of Melbourne. With his John Monash Scholarship, William will complete a Master of Public Health at Harvard, specialising in Clinical Effectiveness. Following this, he plans to complete intensive care training. William intends to return to work as an intensivist in central Australia, with particular interest in retrieval and periadmission care of critically ill patients in remote Australia and working towards creating a robust Indigenous medical workforce and teaching.



Minh-Quan Nguyen Australian Universities' Consortium John Monash Scholar Bachelor of Civil Laws, University of Oxford

Minh-Quan has a Bachelor of Arts, Diploma in Languages and Juris Doctor from the University of Melbourne, where he was awarded the Bachelor of Arts Medal and the Supreme Court Prize. He was an associate to Chief Justice French and Justice Gordon of the High Court of Australia and now works for the Solicitor-General for Victoria. Minh-Quan will use his John Monash Scholarship to undertake a Bachelor of Civil Law at the University of Oxford. His study will concentrate on comparative public law and public law theory with a focus on addressing emerging challenges to the legal accountability of governments and public institutions.



Sarah Schwartz Roden Cutler NSW John Monash Scholar Master of Laws, Harvard University

Sarah is a social justice lawyer who represents disadvantaged and marginalised clients at Legal Aid NSW. She is the NSW Co-Convenor of Australian Lawyers for Human Rights and worked as Research Director to the Chief Justice of NSW. Sarah holds a Bachelor of Arts and a Bachelor of Laws (Honours) from the University of Sydney. With her John Monash Scholarship, Sarah will complete a Master of Laws at Harvard, where she will engage in comparative study on the use of public and anti-discrimination law to address housing inequality. She intends to pursue a career leading legal advocacy and law reform to address social inequality in Australia.



Jessie Smith Susan and Isaac Wakil John Monash Scholar PhD in Law, University of Cambridge

Jessie is a solicitor who held joint conduct of the largest terrorism and national security law practice in Australia. She completed her BA (Honours) and an LLB (Honours) at the University of Melbourne. Jessie has worked closely with terrorist offenders to develop a blueprint for the nation's first forensic de-radicalisation program to assist a court pre-sentence. With her John Monash Scholarship, Jessie will complete a PhD at Cambridge, exploring how courts might encourage and evaluate the renunciation of violence with significant implications for Australia's domestic security.



Kay Song BHP John Monash Scholar DPhil in Engineering Science, University of Oxford

Kay has a Bachelor of Philosophy (Science) with Honours in physics from the Australian National University. She is passionate about clean energy and believes that nuclear fusion is the clean, safe and reliable energy solution the world needs. Catherine is tackling humanity's climate and resource problems in a world-leading group at Cambridge. Her PhD(Eng) develops a novel lens that enables risk-based analysis of resource futures and prioritisation of interventions, including original re-framing of these problems as matters of national security to motivate collaborative ownership.

She was named on the prestigious Forbes 30 Under 30 list in recognition of the impact she has made through her prior roles in the energy and water sectors as well as her research. She was on the leadership committee of 88Pianists - a project that engaged thousands of children in an Engineering+Music program that culminated in a World Record, which was broadcast by the BBC and received international attention.

Catherine actively maintains links with Australia and engages with her alma mater. This year, she held a stimulating discussion with The Hon. Malcolm Turnbull and Lucy Turnbull AO during the CUANZ Gala Dinner and attended the Advance UK Relaunch, thanks to the hospitality of The Hon. Jeannie Lopes, Yasmin Allen, Sir Michael Hintze GCSG AM and His Excellency the Hon. George Brandis QC.



"Never did I think I would be so diligently pondering existential risks. Consideration of these issues certainly pushes one's philosophical comfort zone. It is a thrill to be switching between an engineering hat, delving into risk-based systems science, and a sociology hat, working on ways to motivate collaborative ownership. In our evermore complex world, we all certainly need to keep our wits about us to ensure sustainability into the future."



Dr Kevin Tan 2018 Susan and Isaac Wakil Foundation John Monash Scholar

Kevin is currently completing an MSC in healthcare innovation at Copenhagen Business School in Denmark. In August he completed a Policy Fellowship at the Department of the Prime

Minister and Cabinet, focusing on the drivers of fragmented care. The output of his work in Canberra will help to improve integrated care for patients with chronic diseases. For his upcoming thesis, Kevin will focus on the implementation of healthcare innovation through an organisational lens. In particular, he is interested in the interface between humans, technology and complex adaptive systems, and how we can work with, rather than in spite of, complexity.

"Health services research will need to move away from linear models of thinking towards one of complexity and integration."

Katherine Mansted 2016 Roth/Segal John Monash Harvard Scholar

At her John Monash Scholarship interview, Katherine outlined her strong belief in the need for inclusive, informed public debate in Australia on technology policy and national security issues. After completing a Public Policy Masters at Harvard's Kennedy School of Government as a Roth/Segal John Monash Harvard Scholar, she returned to Canberra in 2018. Katherine is now the public policy lead at The National Security College – a joint initiative between The Australian National University and federal government. She is also a non-resident fellow at Harvard's Belfer Center for Science and International Affairs, and an adjunct lecturer in cyber security at Bond University. Katherine has sought to contribute to the public debate and equip others with information and ideas to pitch in: she co-hosts the National Security Podcast, writes for policy blogs and mainstream outlets, and regularly speaks on technology and security issues to public, academic and government audiences.



"Expanding the national security conversation to include civil society, businesses and citizens, will be a 'force multiplier' for our ability to safeguard Australia's national interests and our democracy."

Kate Griffiths 2012 Origin Foundation John Monash Scholar

Kate's career bridges science and public policy, bringing evidence to bear on the big issues facing Australian governments. Kate is a Senior Associate at Grattan Institute, where she has co-authored 10 reports including policy recommendations to reduce the influence of money in politics, fix Australia's energy mess, make



school funding fairer, and improve placebased targeting of healthcare.

Kate is a scientist and analyst with experience in strategy consulting and public policy development, both inside and outside of government. Her Masters research at the University of Oxford, supported by a John Monash Scholarship, developed

a new strategy for the Millennium Seed Bank to improve the biodiversity of this global reserve. More than 150 organisations in 80 countries are involved in the Millennium Seed Bank Partnership, which aims to 'bank' seed from at least a quarter of the world's plants for sustainable use and future posterity.

"Science and policy are too often separate worlds – yet science can contribute both an evidence-base for good policy and a different approach to solving policy problems."



Harrison Steel 2016 Roden Cutler NSW John Monash Scholar

Harrison Steel is soon to complete his DPhil in Engineering Science at the University of Oxford with the support of a John Monash Scholarship, where he worked on new techniques for engineering and controlling complex

biological systems. One outcome of his research was the development and commercialisation of an open-source robotic platform, Chi.Bio, which is changing the way researchers in academia and industry conduct experiments. It combines a broad array of sensors and control features into a single device which can automate complex procedures and enable new studies. Releasing Chi.Bio as an open-source project made his invention widely accessible, which combined with its many applications in the biological and medical sciences has led to swift adoption across the research community.

Harrison intends to continue his development of cutting-edge tools that combine biological and robotic control elements; his ongoing research is probing how communities of multiple single-celled organisms (such as the human microbiome) can be measured and manipulated.

Dr Alice Chang

2008 John Monash Scholar

With the support of her John Monash Scholarship, Alice completed her MPhil in Public Health at Cambridge University in 2009. The focus of her study was rural public health issues, particularly chronic diseases in rural Australia. Since returning to Australia, Alice has been located in rural north Queensland as the Director of Child and Youth Mental Health Service in Cairns Hospital. In the past year she has opened the 'Youth step up step down service' which is the first therapeutic residential service in Queensland to help young people age 16–21 suffering from mental health issues with an alternative to hospitalisation. Alice has also established the mothers' and baby infant mental health program in the indigenous and remote communities in far North Queensland, to help mothers with perinatal mental health issues. She has also opened a cognitive screening program for young people to assist with the treatment and rehabilitation of youth with cognitive and mental health issues.

Alice has been invited by the Cambodian Government to set up the first Child and Adolescent psychiatry service and run teaching programs. On the international and national level, Alice is an advocate for the wellbeing of doctors and addressing the increasing numbers of suicides and mental health issues of young doctors and trainees. She works with the World Psychiatric Association as the Chair of the early career psychiatrists of the Royal Australian and New Zealand College of Psychiatrists, and the local Cairns branch of the Doctor's Association.

"As a child psychiatrist, I believe in the importance of early intervention, and the direction of my work reflects that. It is important to provide interventions both at a systems and individual level – implementing programs as early as perinatal mothers and infants, to teenagers and youths. When working on international development projects, there are many similar issues faced by rural and indigenous communities in Australia, but focusing and funding early intervention will have long term positive impacts for the individual and the society at large."

Dr Sam Brophy-Williams 2012 John Monash Scholar

Sam was always interested in the systems that made the hospitals he has worked in tick, and how healthcare works in very different ways around the world. After completing his medical (MBBS) degree from the University of Western Australia (with stints in Sierra Leone and the Kimberley), Sam undertook a Master of Public Health at Harvard University on a John Monash Scholarship, concentrating on Global Health and Public Health Leadership. Following this transformative year, Sam has worked in Sydney, Darwin and Perth, completing his training as a paediatrician, and has worked in clinical paediatrics, research, medical education and quality improvement roles in Afghanistan and Timor Leste.

"The world we live in is getting smaller and diseases all travel further and faster than ever before. From a public health perspective, this is in equal parts hugely challenging and incredibly exciting."

Sam is back in Perth and will spend 2020 at Perth Children's Hospital working in refugee health and infectious diseases, while undertaking research on rheumatic heart disease at the Telethon Kids Institute.



"We already have the resources, the knowledge, and the technical ability to make dramatic, lasting improvements in child health globally – the hard part, and the rewarding part, is bringing all of those elements to bear to make those seismic changes, and make them stick."



Dr Katherine Franklin 2017 Zelman Cowen John Monash Scholar

Katherine used her John Monash Scholarship to complete a Masters degree in International Public Health (Hons.) and a Diploma of Tropical Medicine and Hygiene (Hons.) at Oxford University. As part of her Masters, she completed an Internship at the World Health Organisation (WHO) in Geneva where

she worked on a project researching Meningitis outbreaks in Africa and attended the World Health Assembly. After completing her studies, Katherine worked in Iraq with Medecins San Frontieres and volunteered at a paediatric hospital in Laos. In 2019, Katherine returned to Melbourne to complete her paediatric training at the Royal Children's Hospital, a stark change of environments after spending months in some of the world's most dangerous conflict zones. She hopes to undertake more volunteer assignments overseas and continue to transfer skills and resources wherever possible.

"The John Monash Scholarship opened a door for me that I never even knew existed. I hope that I can use the knowledge and connections gained from my scholarship to benefit people around the world who haven't had the same opportunities I have had."



"The field of neural engineering is developing at a staggering pace, and the potential for improving people's lives is immense. It would be wise for Australia, as a pioneer in this field, to ride this wave."

Ahmad Shah Idil 2018 Australian Universities' John Monash Scholar

Ahmad believes deeply in the capacity of science and technology to improve people's lives. Since commencing his PhD research at University College London's Implanted Devices Group, he has continued his research in the development of the world's first optogenetic device for a clinical application: the treatment of drug-resistant focal epilepsy. Ahmad's research aims to explore the sorts of materials and functional structures that can be safely implanted inside the human body over the scale of a human lifetime and explores how these implant structures can modulate abnormal neural activity to restore health to people suffering from neurodegenerative disease.

Scholar Collaborations

Through the Foundation Alumni community building events and communications across all regions worldwide and in Australia, we will increasingly enable new connections between Scholars. The examples of collaboration below are heartening evidence of the outcomes possible when John Monash Scholars combine forces.



Dr Amy McLennan (2009 John Monash Scholar) & Dr Katherine Daniell (2005 John Monash Scholar)

Katherine Daniell and Amy McLennan are helping build a new branch of engineering to manage artificial intelligence safely to scale. This new branch of engineering will equip workers, regulators and citizens to better create, respond to, and interact with AI-driven cyber-physical systems.

"Talking about artificial intelligence alone isn't enough. We need to discuss the systems in which it will be a critical component"

Genevieve Bell, Katherine Daniell, and Amy McLennan

The two John Monash Scholars are based at the 3A Institute, which was established by Director Genevieve Bell in 2017 inside the ANU College of Engineering and Computer Science. The College is embarking on a 15-year project to reimagine a new type of engineering and computing, one that is custom-built and fit for the middle of the 21st century.

Why? Because the future is being built around us every day and there is an opportunity to improve it. In a context of rapidly changing relationships between people, technologies and our environment, we can't just deploy

methods and techniques of the past and expect new outcomes for the future. We also need to bring in different voices and perspectives, to ensure we build a world we all want to live in.

That's where Katherine and Amy come in. Katherine is a systems engineer who, as a John Monash Scholar, developed expertise in participatory water management. Amy is a medical scientist whose scholarship-supported study was in cultural anthropology and human ecology. Both have experience working in policy making, design and facilitation. They are bringing new and different perspectives into the design and development of the new branch of engineering.

With research and a Masters course already underway and a suite of innovative microcredentials being built for launch in 2020, the 3A Institute is already starting to see the new branch of engineering take shape.





Dr Jacqueline Baker (2004 John Monash Scholar) & Dr Sarah Milne (2005 John Monash Scholar)

Jacqui Baker is currently a lecturer in South East Asian Studies at Murdoch University and Sarah Milne is a Senior Lecturer at the Crawford School of Public Policy, Australian National University. Sarah and Jacqui received a small grant to work with U4 Anti-Corruption Resource Centre based in Bergen, Norway. Building on their 2015 Special Issue on corruption, illicit monetary flows and development in Southeast Asia, Sarah and Jacqui researched and cowrote a U4 Issue paper entitled Cambodia's Anti-Corruption Regime 2008-2018. In this paper, they considered the puzzle of Cambodia's anti-corruption reforms which have seen remarkable success, despite narrowing space for democratic freedoms and major electoral deficits. To answer this question, they developed an innovative critical political economy framework, arguing that anti-corruption reforms that had seen success were largely liberal, rather than democratic and further centralised power in the hands of the executive. The paper was presented to international aid organisations in June 2018 in Phnom Penh. Sarah also presented the paper at the ANU's Anti-corruption Update on 'New Frontiers for building anti-corruption coalitions' in September 2019, to an audience of scholars and government.

Sarah and Jacqui are planning to conduct follow up research in Cambodia in early 2020 and are aiming to publish a journal article on the subject next year.

2018 John Monash Oration 8th October 2018, Sydney

The annual John Monash Oration explores different aspects of leadership with the discussion stimulated by inviting speakers who represent different sectors of the community.

The Oration was held at the Commonwealth Bank of Australia's Colonial Theatre in Sydney, with the Vice Chancellor of Australian National University, Professor Brian P. Schmidt AC delivering the oration. 2006 John Monash Scholar Dr Bridget Vincent provided the response.

'The future of education, the future of work - The days of jobs for life are a thing of the past for the majority – how can the Australian Higher Education system adapt, so that future generations will be well equipped to respond to the opportunities that will arise? This challenge is full of possibilities', was the topic for the evening.

"Monash was someone who never quit learning. Who took his education in engineering and brought about a small revolution in Australian construction through the use of reinforced concrete," Professor Schmidt said "He is, of course, best known for emerging from a not particularly profound role of part-time service in the militia in Melbourne, to become one of the most influential military leaders of the modern era."

Bridget's response highlighted how skills honed by good education were important in the face of the growth of AI, "having so many jobs become replaceable through automation is a risk as well as an opportunity." Bridget said.

This was the 7th John Monash Oration held in partnership with the Commonwealth Bank of Australia.

In the last financial year, the Foundation received substantial donations from both existing supporters and new partners. 
The Foundation awarded seventeen 2019 John Monash Scholarships, providing 29 scholarship years – a financial commitment of \$2.03m.

The Foundation continues to implement its investment strategy focussing on protection of capital and minimising large variations in portfolio returns. The Foundation achieves this by investing in a diversified asset allocation portfolio within considered risk constraints.

Subsequent to the end of the financial year, the Prime Minister of Australia, Mr Scott Morrison, announced a contribution of \$5m to the Foundation to fund a Bob Hawke John Monash Scholarship and a further announcement to also fund a Tim Fischer John Monash Scholarship. In addition, the Lee Liberman Charitable Foundation committed \$2.5m to a new perpetual scholarship.

Statement of Financial Position


