The General Sir John Monash Foundation awards scholarships for postgraduate study overseas to outstanding Australians, with a bold mission to encourage academic excellence of our nation's brightest individuals, foster the growth of their leadership qualities and harness their talents to build Australia's capabilities for the future. General Sir John Monash is a revered Australian leader and military hero. Born in Melbourne to Jewish-Prussian immigrants in 1865, Monash showed a love of learning from an early age. A true renaissance man, Monash sought diversity in his education completing a Master of Engineering, a Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Laws, and a Doctor of Engineering from the University of Melbourne.

He also excelled in his career as a civil engineer, working on major infrastructure projects, serving as president of the Victorian Institute of Engineers, and later as Chairman of the State Electricity Commission of Victoria. In World War 1, Monash rose to the rank of General and is recognised as instrumental in the success of the Allied forces, was knighted in the field and is revered for his great leadership in both battle and post-war care and repatriation of the Australian troops. He played a significant role in the origins of Anzac Day and was a driving force for the establishment of the Shrine of Remembrance. He died in 1931 and is remembered as a leader who believed in the power of education and democracy.

"General Sir John Monash is to Australia what Churchill is to the United Kingdom or Lincoln is to the United States: imperfect humans who risked their lives (and reputations) to leave the world a little better than the one they were born into. In doing so, their lives have become the guiding lights of modernity."

It is with great pride that we have watched our Scholars navigate the peculiar challenges of the past few years, dominated by the global pandemic, with many of them involved in key roles of



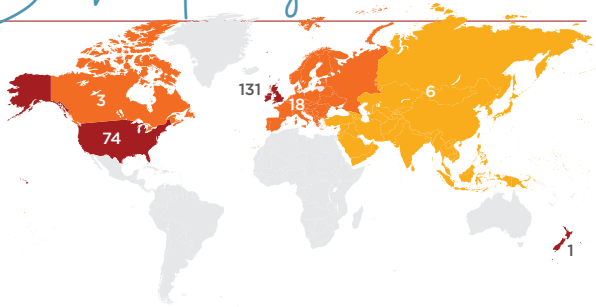

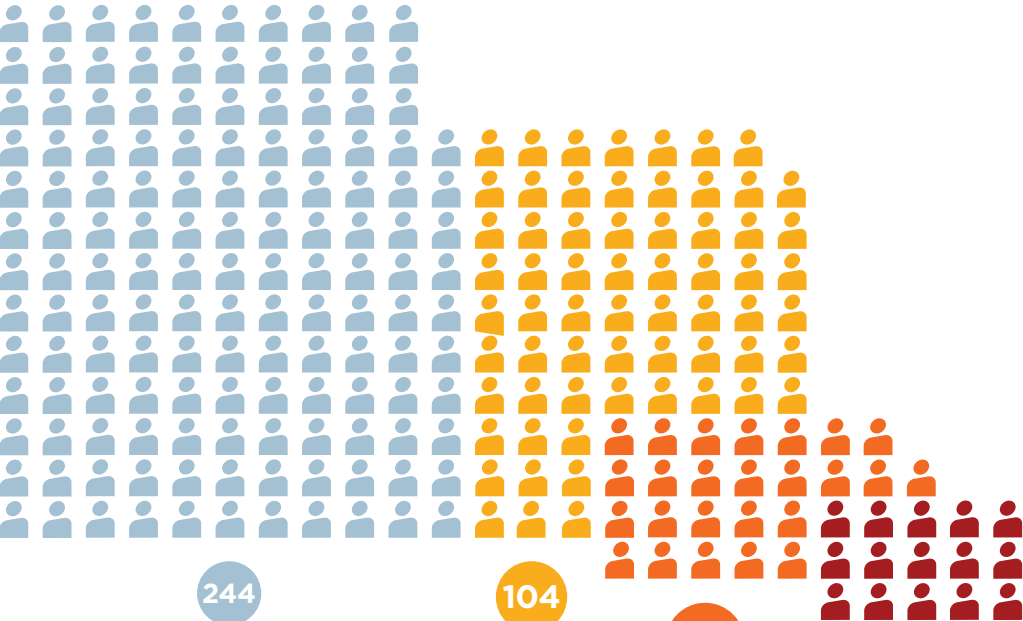

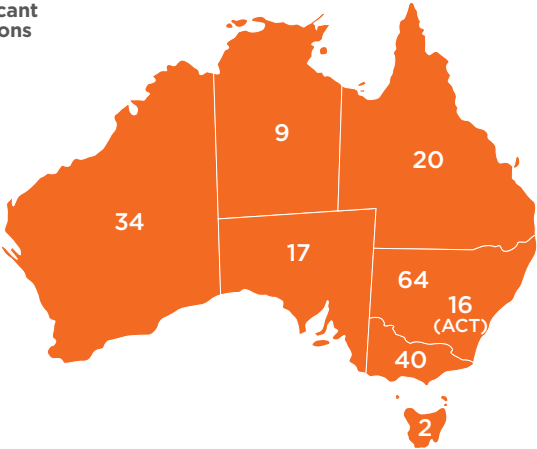

Summary: The 2023 Scholars

The General Sir John Monash Scholarships provide recipients the opportunity to study at any of the leading tertiary institutions across the globe including Harvard, Oxford, Cambridge, IE Madrid, The University of Groningen, INSEAD, King's College London and many more. This truly national Scholarship is funded by Australia's civic society, including the Commonwealth and State governments, corporates, universities and private philanthropists.

This 19th cohort of John Monash Scholars includes a Wallabies prop studying to close the gap between regional and city healthcare; a scientist dedicated to fighting climate change with AI; a physicist who hopes to unlock the mysteries of quantum science; an engineer who wants to develop robotics to support marginalised Australians and a Crown Prosecutor deeply committed to justice.

This year's award round secured 28 years of study for a diverse group of Australians after a thorough selection process from 244 applications, followed by 104 formal first round in person interviews in all states and territories, followed by 40 National in person interviews with esteemed judging panels. As well as demonstrating academic excellence in their fields, Scholars have been chosen based on strong leadership ability and potential and their commitment and vision to deliver a positive impact for the benefit of Australia.

**Master of Business Administration
Columbia University**

Roden Cutler NSW John Monash Scholar

Jessica was awarded a Bachelor of Actuarial Studies with Distinction from the University of New South Wales where she was a Co-op Scholar. With a commitment to bridging the worlds of business and social impact to support financial inclusion, she intends to undertake a Master of Business Administration with a specialisation in social impact. She aims to use the knowledge and skills gained from her MBA to provide access to inclusive financial services which are affordable, safe, and appropriate for the needs of vulnerable Australians. Jessica has hands-on experience in microfinance through her studies and internships in Indonesia on a New Colombo Plan Scholarship in 2018. She currently works as a strategy consultant at L.E.K. Consulting, is a volunteer coach for socioeconomically disadvantaged girls at the Harding Miller Education Foundation and conducts monitoring and evaluation of development programmes in Indonesia for the Nusa Tenggara Association.



Bridget Dunne

**MSc in Criminal Justice Policy
London School of Economics
Zelman Cowen John Monash Scholar**

Bridget is a lawyer and human rights advocate with a strong interest in criminal law and social justice and was awarded a Bachelor of Arts and a Bachelor of Laws and a University Medal from the University of Tasmania. Bridget has worked in a wide range of roles developing her understanding of local and global justice systems, as a criminal defence lawyer for Legal Aid in Canberra, as an associate to the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Tasmania and to Justice Bell on the High Court of Australia, and as a war crimes researcher at the International Criminal Court in the Hague. Since 2020, Bridget has worked in Myanmar as a lawyer and human rights advocate, working as Head of Programmes for a local NGO which is committed to developing a robust and fair justice system in Myanmar. She is strongly committed to reforming criminal justice systems so that they are more just and humane, particularly for the most vulnerable members of society. As a John Monash Scholar, Bridget will undertake a MSc in Criminal Justice Policy at the London School of Economics with the aim to make a strong contribution to law reform in Australia.



Sienna Lake

**MSc in Social Anthropology
London School of Economics
Dame Quentin Bryce AD CVO John Monash Scholar**

Sienna is a criminal lawyer living and working on Miriwoong Gajerrong country in Kununurra, a town in the East Kimberley region of Western Australia. She grew up in Sydney and moved to Canberra to study a Bachelor of Arts/Laws (Hons) at the Australian National University, after which she worked as an Associate to the Chief Justice of the ACT Supreme Court. Sienna struggled to find real-world application of her legal studies until exposed to the injustices faced by Indigenous people in the criminal justice system. This exposure shaped the rest of her degree and focused her career ambitions on criminal law due to the field's emphasis on advocacy, rights, and contact with clients who have been exposed to an elevated level of criminogenic factors. As a John Monash Scholar, she aims to build on her undergraduate degree which included law and anthropology, but as distinctly separate disciplines by undertaking a Masters degree at London School of Economics which will see the utility of combining these disciplines together to interrogate systems of power and social organisation.



Henry Marshall

PhD Programme for Health Professionals

University of Cambridge

Chairman's Circle John Monash Scholar

Henry is a young clinician-researcher with a passion to transform the management of dementia through the discovery and implementation of precision medicine. Precision medicine refers to the application of novel diagnostic and therapeutic tools, which are tailored to the differences in people's genes, environments, and lifestyles. An important application of these technologies is in neurodegenerative diseases, such as dementia, where conventional medicine has thus far failed to develop effective methods to predict and prevent disease progression. Henry has developed a strong track record in research whilst completing his undergraduate medical degree at University of Adelaide. With the John Monash Scholarship, he aims to complete his training in this specialised field at Cambridge University, then return to Australia and lead the translation of genomic and bioinformatic based tools for dementia into the Australian healthcare system to improve the management of the disease, if not cure it.



Nicholas Maurer

PhD in Applied Mathematics

Massachusetts Institute of Technology

BHP John Monash Scholar

Nicholas is a graduate physicist and engineer, receiving First-Class Honours and a University Medal for his studies at the University of Queensland. He is passionate about energy and education and aspires to make a difference in both fields. His research focuses on future decarbonised energy systems and he has published an award-winning paper on this topic. Nicholas worked in offshore wind for K2 Management and behind-the-metre energy for Fredon. As a senior UQ Outreach Ambassador, he inspired high school students to pursue tertiary education with an emphasis on STEM disciplines and founded Lambda Learning to further engage students in mathematics. With the John Monash Scholarship, Nicholas intends to study a PhD in Applied Mathematics at Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Post study, he hopes to assist in establishing the theoretical framework for the future electricity system with the goal of decarbonising Australia's electricity network by 2050. He loves to read, spend time outdoors and play sports of any kind. He is a father and husband and strives to live up to both titles.



Eve Poland

DPhil in Inorganic Chemistry

University of Oxford

Australian Universities' John Monash Scholar

Dedicated to chemistry, Eve has a deep concern for the environment and aspires to use her career to contribute to solving sustainability issues such as plastic pollution and heightened levels of atmospheric CO₂. In 2019 she founded the UTAS Zero Waste Society and is also an accomplished musician who plays multiple instruments, writes, and records her own compositions. Eve's doctoral project will be concerned with developing new catalysts to transform CO₂ into value-added commodities in a process known as small molecule activation. Her research will enable her to work on how carbon dioxide can be reused constructively and sustainably with the aim to translate developments in this field to other greenhouse gases. Removing greenhouse gases from our atmosphere and using them constructively has global significance, helping to reverse the adverse effects of climate change, and allowing other environmentally harmful practices, such as using fossil fuels to make plastics, to be discarded. By bringing what she learns at Oxford back to Australia, Eve hopes to drive a vibrant cascade of innovation in the field of green chemistry.



Chris Raine

Master of Public Administration

University College London

Zelman Cowen John Monash Scholar

Chris is a mental health and addiction social entrepreneur. He was the Founder and CEO of Hello Sunday Morning, a non-profit that supports one of the largest communities in the world of people looking to change their relationship with alcohol. Hello Sunday Morning provides free access to peer and/or clinical support for any Australian looking to change their relationship with alcohol, in the moment they need it. Chris currently has a portfolio of roles in the mental health/addiction sectors including, CEO of Australians for Mental Health an advocacy organisation focused on mental health reform and Director of Clean Slate Clinic, a GP-led home detox service. Chris is a Young Australian of the Year (QLD), a Westpac Social Change Fellow and received a Skoll Scholarship to complete an MBA at Oxford University. As a John Monash Scholar, Chris aims to complete a Master of Public Administration with a focus on outlining an investment thesis to build an impact investment fund focused exclusively on addiction and mental health.



Abi Rajkumar

Master of Laws

Columbia University

Rio Tinto John Monash Scholar

Abi is a Crown Prosecutor in the Northern Territory who believes the law should be used to change lives for the better. She has worked as an Adviser to federal and state politicians and has travelled across the country exploring communities and identifying opportunities for change. Abi is passionate about making a significant and lasting impact through new approaches to justice systems and evidence-based progressive policy. Abi runs a volunteer-led boxing and wellbeing programme for youth at risk of entering the Northern Territory's youth justice system where police officers, lawyers, young professionals, athletes, and psychologists work together to give young people an opportunity that has not existed in the Territory before. She also uses film to tell stories of experience and to highlight the importance of recognising our shared humanity. Following her Master of Laws as a John Monash Scholar, Abi plans to return to Australia and use the law as a tool for social change and her new knowledge and experiences to have a significant impact on justice policy reform, making a tangible difference to the lives of victims and offenders.



Mathilde Ritman

DPhil in AI applications in Climate Science

University of Oxford

Wesfarmers John Monash Scholar

Mathilde is a young mathematician and scientist passionate about Artificial Intelligence in Climate Science. She has a lifelong ambition to make global communities more sustainable through building equitable climate resilience. Mathilde's development of mathematical and scientific skills (with two First-Class Honours from the University of Melbourne) and the ongoing climate issues have inspired her to find new ways to impact lasting change. Her commitment to sustainability has taken her to cultural immersions on Yorta Yorta country in northern Victoria and self-sufficiency farms in Thailand. Most recently, she worked with the Tuvaluan Meteorological Service to understand their changing flood risks. With the John Monash Scholarship, Mathilde will study a Doctor of Philosophy focusing on AI in Climate Science and is committed to returning to Australia and using her talent for STEM and learnings from her doctoral degree to be a key enabler of calculated and innovative work that will be transformative.



Tomas Robertson

Master of Public Policy

University of Oxford

Tim Fischer John Monash Scholar

Tomas was born in Wellington and grew up in Dubbo, both in regional NSW. He moved to Sydney and studied a Bachelor of Medical Science at the University of Sydney, also playing rugby for the University. In 2016 he commenced his first year in the Doctor of Medicine degree at University of Sydney and started playing rugby professionally for the NSW Waratahs, leading to his selection for the Australian National Rugby Union Team, the Wallabies. In order to represent his country at an international level, Tomas suspended his studies in the Doctor of Medicine but completed a Master of Public Health and a Master of Philosophy (Medicine), both at the University of Sydney. In 2020 he moved to Perth to play for the Western Force Rugby team, playing over eighty Super Rugby games and being capped for his country on twenty-seven occasions. He is hoping to participate in the 2023 Rugby World Cup in France. Tomas will undertake a Master of Public Policy as a John Monash Scholar with the long-term commitment to work on closing the gap in health outcomes between regional and metropolitan Australia.

As a John Monash Scholar, Hugo aims to study an MPP in Health Policy to build on his experiences as a start-up founder, McKinsey consultant and high-performing student. He is motivated to contribute to advancing our nation's health system allowing Australians to benefit from world-leading health.

DPhil in Engineering Science

University of Oxford

Alex is enthusiastic about equality, inclusion and the elimination of bias and discrimination present in Australian society. Through their own challenges, they are acutely aware of the struggles faced by people who are not well-represented in a group and aims to be part of the positive change. Alex completed a BEng (Hons) (Mechatronics) with BMacSci (Pure Mathematics) at University of Adelaide and was the valedictorian for University of Adelaide School of Mechanical Engineering. Alex's career interests lie in robotics, particularly human-robot interaction, and cooperation. They believe that robotics can be used as a positive tool to help people and enrich their quality of life and hope to be able to apply their technical skills to create solutions to help tackle some of the big problems faced by marginalised groups. As a John Monash Scholar, Alex intends to study a DPhil in Engineering Science at Oxford University.

Madison intends to elevate her skills in disaster risk resilience and leadership by pursuing a Master of Disaster Risk and Resilience at the University of Canterbury, a course widely regarded globally as the best in this field. She aspires to train women to lead community resilience programmes and develop a transferable decision-making framework to enhance accountability between levels of government. Madison is an avid hiker, novice triathlete and community builder, bringing people together through non-profit ventures and board games.

Prior to joining the Assembly, Karri worked as a commercial lawyer at Arnold Bloch Leibler. She is deeply committed to justice and self-determination and sits on the Board of Fitzroy Legal Service and the Advisory Council of the Indigenous Law and Justice Hub at Melbourne Law School. As a John Monash Scholar, Karri aims to pursue a Master of Laws focusing on human rights and comparative studies to bring together her lived experience as an Aboriginal woman and her professional legal expertise. Her goal is to give effect to structural reform which gives First Peoples the power and authority to decide First Peoples' issues.
